Zoning Code Changes Approved

Council approved various amendments to the Planning and Zoning Code that took effect on August 14, 2015. The amendments include new regulations on the following items:

- Antique Malls
- Brew Pubs, Microbreweries, Microdistilleries and Microwineries.
- Vehicle Washing Establishments
- Mobile Food Vending (Food Trucks)
- Farmer Markets

The amendments also include improved regulations related to architectural standards within our Industrial Districts and updates to the sign requirements. Digital signs are now permitted in all commercial zoning districts.

Please Drive Alert; Our Schools Are Back In Session!

The 2015/2016 school year is underway and our students are settling into their daily routines. Please remember to be extra careful while driving on our streets, especially when our young people are traveling to and from school. Drive alert and make sure that you are not allowing distractions, like texting or cell phone calls, to divert your attention from the road. Please do your part to protect our students and keep them safe.

Remember:

- To stop for a school bus that is stopped and loading or unloading passengers.
- Be especially watchful once the school bus pulls away after unloading students. You never know when a child may unexpectedly cross the street without paying attention.
- School zone speed limit is 20 MPH. This is during designated hours. (children going to or leaving school and during recess hours) If you are doing over 20 MPH in a school zone during these times you may be cited.

Britton Lane Full Depth Reclamation and Water Main Installation Project

The City of Monroe has employed Howell Contractors, Inc. to reconstruct approximately 5,200 linear feet of Britton Lane from Todhunter Road to Macready Avenue. This project will be a full-depth reclamation project and will also include the installation of a new 12 inch ductile iron water main with new ¾ inch copper water services, installation of new fire hydrants, the removal and replacement of existing storm structures and storm pipe, and removal and replacement of residential drive aprons required to install the new water main. The work will also include miscellaneous work such as manhole adjustments, any necessary removal and replacement of signs and mailboxes, and associated grading, seeding and straw. As part of this project, the contractor will also perform a 2 inch mill and resurfacing of Deneen Avenue from Britton Lane to the dead end. This project will include the removal and replacement of sixteen (16) curb inlets with associated pipe required to connect the existing pipe to the new inlets, removal and replacement of approximately 2,200 linear feet of curb and gutter, removal and replacement of deteriorated drive aprons and associated grading, seeding and straw. A minimum of one lane of travel will be maintained at all times during construction for both projects. Utility installation along Britton Lane will commence shortly after the completion of Deneen Avenue and is anticipated to be completed by June of 2016.

Ragweed Season Begins in Southwest Ohio

The Southwest Ohio Air Quality Agency has recorded ragweed in recent pollen counts signifying ragweed has begun to bloom in Greater Cincinnati. Ragweed is a summer annual that produces abundant pollen and is the primary cause of hay fever. Although ragweed is already present, September tends to be its peak month and those who suffer from allergies may have increased symptoms during the next several weeks.

Ragweed plants are dominant in the Midwest and produce billions of pollen grains which are easily caught by the wind and spread throughout the region. The severity of hay fever depends on the amount of pollen in the air and the degree of sensitivity of the person. On cloudy, windless or rainy days, the average sufferer may have fewer symptoms due to little pollination and dissemination of the pollen. When the weather becomes hot, dry, sunny and windy, symptoms may spike and return. A frost usually ends the hay fever season for most sufferers.

To reduce exposure to ragweed and other pollens and molds, the Southwest Ohio Air Quality Agency recommends:

- Avoid areas with freshly cut grass and avoid lawn care activities, such as raking leaves or working with compost.
- Minimize outdoor activity between 5 a.m. and 10 a.m. – when pollen levels are highest.
- After being outdoors, it is best to shower and change clothing, as pollen can adhere to clothing, skin and hair. Be aware that pets can also bring pollen into your home.
- Keep windows closed and use an air conditioner in the home and car as much as possible to reduce the amount of allergens entering.
- Don't hang sheets or clothing outside to dry. Pollens can collect on them.
- Contact an allergist or doctor for medical advice.

The Southwest Ohio Air Quality Agency tracks pollen and mold levels on weekdays and posts the counts by 10 a.m. at 513-946-7753 and SouthwestOhioAir.org. The higher the pollen and mold count is, the greater the likelihood that particles will make their way into the nasal passages and lungs and induce allergic symptoms. 2015 Annual Resurfacing Project

The City of Monroe has employed Barrett Paving to perform three (3) 2 inch Mill & Pave projects located on Valleybrook Drive, the alley between East Avenue and Old Street just north of E. Elm Street and the City of Monroe Fire House located on State Route 4. This project will also include the removal and replacement of thirteen (13) curb inlets along Valleybrook Drive, removal of the existing corrugated metal pipe and installation of reinforced concrete pipe. The existing culvert on Valleybrook Drive will be removed and replaced with 43 inch x 68 inch elliptical, reinforced concrete pipe. This project will also include curb and gutter and sidewalk removal and replacement as part of the inlet installation and culvert installation along with associated grading, seeding and straw. Meadowood Drive will be milled 2 inches and resurfaced with 3 inches of new asphalt. This portion of the project includes removal and replacement of curb and gutter in need of repairs and removal and replacement of damaged sidewalk. A new concrete drive will be installed at the City of Monroe Fire House from State Route 4 to the existing concrete pad. The walking path around Monroe Crossings Park will also be resurfaced with 2 inches of new asphalt. One lane of traffic will remain opened on all roads during construction. The anticipated completion date for this project is November 20, 2015.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK



Keep your family safe with a working smoke alarm in every bedroom.

Did you know that roughly half of home fire deaths result from fires reported between 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., when most people are asleep?

Smoke alarms save lives. If there is a fire in your home, smoke spreads fast and you need smoke alarms to give you time to get out. In fact, having a working smoke alarm cuts the chances of dying in a reported fire in half!

When it comes to smoke alarms, it's about "location, location, location".

The **key message** of this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, October 4-10, is to install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of your home, including the basement. Larger homes may need more alarms.

The Monroe Fire Department is excited to share this important information so everyone better understands the lifesaving value of home smoke alarms.

The two most commonly recognized smoke detection technologies are **ionization smoke detection** and **photoelectric smoke detection**.

Ionization smoke alarms are generally more responsive to flaming fires.

Photoelectric smoke alarms are generally more responsive to fires that begin with a long period of smoldering (called "smoldering fires").

For best protection, it is recommended both (ionization and photoelectric) technologies be used in homes. In addition to individual ionization and photoelectric alarms, combination alarms that include both technologies in a single device are available.



City of Monroe Leaf Pick-Up Schedule

The City of Monroe will begin their leaf pickup during the week of October 19, 2015 and end during the week of November 30, 2015. Leaves should be raked in piles along the curb line, but not in the street or blocking storm water inlets. **Leaves that are combined with grass clippings will not be collected.** Leaves must be raked to the curb no later than 7:00 a.m. on Monday of your scheduled week. Leaves raked after this time may not be picked up until the next scheduled week, if any. You may see the Street Department in your area during a time when it is not scheduled. As time permits, we will be going through nonscheduled areas in an effort to keep up with the falling leaves. There will be no leaf pickup the week of Thanksgiving. **Any leaves gathered after your scheduled week, will not be collected and must be bagged and put out with your garbage for Rumpke to pick up.** If you have any questions, please contact Gina Hugar at 727-8953.

LARGE ITEM PICKUP

The following list is acceptable items and how to contain them: (all dimensions are maximum).

- Carpet.** Cut to 4 foot lengths and tied in 2 foot rolls.
- Wood.** Bundled in 4 foot lengths and 2 foot in diameter and tied. Please hammer all nails.
- Fencing.** Bundled in 4 foot lengths and 2 foot rolls.
- Metal Poles.** Cut to 4 foot lengths and tied together.
- Furniture/Appliances.** Appliances containing chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) i.e. refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners or ice makers, are not collectible until CFC removal is complete. Please call Rumpke at 742-2900 or visit www.rumpke.com to download the necessary refrigerant recovery forms. Once CFC removal is certified, please place the item at the curb for collection with a CFC removal sticker and the completed Refrigerant Recovery Statement (the recovery statement that you received from Rumpke).
- Construction Debris.** In cans or bags of no more than 60 lbs. Do not place in boxes.
- Miscellaneous Small Items.** Place small household items in cans or bags. Drain all fluids from items that contain gasoline or oil.

The following items **ARE NOT** considered large items and will **NOT** be picked up. Car batteries, household chemicals, car and truck tires, yard waste (grass, leaves, brush), rocks, dirt, concrete, and regular trash.
