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Sunday Sales - I-75 Community Entertainment District



I-75 Community Entertainment District

At their August 9th meeting, City Council authorized a ballot issue for the November general election. This ballot issue presents the question of whether or not liquor sales should be permitted in the I-75 Community Entertainment District on Sundays.

In 2015, City Council created the I-75 Community Entertainment District as a way to encourage development on the vacant land

around the interchange. Entertainment districts create a pool of liquor licenses that can be used for qualified developments within the district's boundary. Having available liquor permits is important for future restaurant and similar uses, and the City has very few available permits outside of the Entertainment District.

While creating the district was a proactive step towards encouraging more development around the interchange, the issue of Sunday sales still remains a challenge for certain uses. Within the City, liquor sales on Sundays are only permitted after a site-by-site vote possibly fail presents an increased challenge for recruiting certain prospects. By passing the ballot issue this November, the City will be better able to market the available land to a variety of restaurants, entertainment uses, and amenities that will benefit residents, visitors, and businesses.

Street Light Utility

City Council approved a new street light utility at their meeting of July 26, 2016. This utility will be billed on the customer's monthly utility bill and eliminate the property tax assessment program for those same costs. The street lighting property tax assessment program is being replaced by a street light utility charge. The original program was put into place for residential and business properties to recover the costs of street lights. Annually, the City has levied those costs to each real estate parcel based on the frontage of an individual property. The calculation to determine the amounts to be levied was a cumbersome process and the collection of revenue was one and one-half years in arrears. A simpler process to recover street lighting costs was recommended by the Finance Director based on the overall equal benefit of public safety and security that is being provided to residents and businesses.

A rate billed for street lighting shall be \$1.93 per customer (or unit) per month beginning September 1, 2016, and will first appear on each customer's September utility bill. A customer's annual cost for street lights would be \$23.16. In January 2018, the monthly charge will be recalculated based on the City's 2017 street lighting costs and adjusted every subsequent year based on prior calendar year costs to the City as charged by Duke Energy.

How is the month charge calculated?

In order to determine the monthly street light utility charge, the total street light costs for the prior calendar year is divided by the number of utility accounts billed by the City. Unless otherwise billed by individual units, multiple unit dwellings will be computed and billed by the aggregation of each of the single family equivalents. For example, a four-unit apartment building which is billed in a single billing for the entire dwelling, would be billed at the sum of the four separate units. Therefore, the monthly bill would be \$7.72 (4 x \$1.93/unit).

General Election November 8, 2016

The General Election will be November 8, 2016. If you are not already registered to vote, the deadline to do so is October 11, 2016. If you are already registered to vote but have moved within Ohio and/or changed your name, you must update your voter registration by submitting a new voter registration form.

Upon appearing at the polling place to vote you must give your full name and current address and provide proof of identity. The forms of identification that may be used include an unexpired Ohio driver's license or state identification card with present or former address so long as the voter's present residential address is printed in the official list of registered voters for that precinct; a military identification; a photo identification that was issued by the United States government or the State of Ohio, that contains the voter's name and current address and that has an expiration date that has not passed; an original or copy of a current utility bill with the voter's name and present address; an original or copy of a current bank statement with the voter's name and present address; an original or copy of a current government check with the voter's name and present address; an original or copy of a current paycheck with the voter's name and present address; or an original or copy of a current other government document (other than a notice of voter registration mailed by a board of elections) that shows the voter's name and present address.



Trick-or-Treat

Trick-or-Treat will be held in Monroe on Monday, October 31, 2016, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. Remember these tips for a safe and fun-filled evening.

Walk Safely. Cross the street at corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks. Look left, right and left again when crossing and keep looking as you cross. Put electronic devices down and keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street. Teach children to make eye contact with drivers before crossing in front of them. Always walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, walking facing traffic as far to the left as possible. Children should walk on direct routes with the fewest street crossings. Watch for cars that are turning or backing up. Teach children never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.

Trick-or-Treat With an Adult. Children under the age of 12 should not be alone at night without supervision. If kids are mature enough to be out without supervision, they should stick to familiar areas that are well lit and trick-or-treat in groups.

Keep Costumes Both Creative and Safe. Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors. Choose face paint and makeup whenever possible instead of masks, which can obstruct a child's vision. Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers. When selecting a costume, make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls.

Drive Extra Safely on Halloween. Slow down and be especially alert in residential neighborhoods. Children are excited on Halloween and may move in unpredictable ways. Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs. Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully. Eliminate any distractions inside your car so you can concentrate on the road and your surroundings. Drive slowly, anticipate heavy pedestrian traffic and turn your headlights on earlier in the day to spot children from great distances.

Large Item Pick Up

Large Item Pick Up is scheduled for Saturday, October 22, 2016. Rumpke will have several trucks throughout the City Saturday morning, so it is best to set your items at the curb the night before.

The following is a list of items and how to contain them:

Carpets. Cut to 4 foot lengths and tied in 2 foot rolls.

Wood. Bundled in 4 foot lengths and 2 foot in diameter and tied. Please hammer all nails.

Fencing. Bundled in 4 foot lengths and 2 foot rolls.

Metal poles. Cut to 4 foot lengths and tied together.

Furniture/Appliances. Appliances containing chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) i.e., refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, or ice makers. Please call Rumpke at 513-742-2900 or visit www.rumpke.com to download the necessary refrigerant recovery forms. Once CFC removal is certified, please place the item at the curb for collection with a CFC removal sticker and the completed Refrigerant Recovery Statement.

Construction debris. In cans or bags of no more than 60 lbs. Do not place in boxes.

Miscellaneous small items. Place small household items in cans or bags. Drain all fluids from items that contain gasoline or oil.

Rumpke **will not** pick up car batteries, household chemicals, car and truck tires, yard waste (grass, leaves, brush), rocks, dirt, concrete, and regular trash. If you are unsure about items to set out at the curb, please call Rumpke at 513-742-2900.



Fire Department Receives Staffing Grant

The Fire Department was awarded a SAFER grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency/Department of Homeland Security (FEMA/DHS) on Friday, August 12, 2016.

SAFER is the acronym for “Staffing for Adequate Fire & Emergency Response” and is a competitive grant awards program managed through FEMA/DHS. Awards are based on a peer panel review of both the application and the needs of the community. The application contains multiple sections containing narratives, historical data, funding mechanisms, justifications and demographic information to name a few. Fire departments numbering in the thousands submit applications for these grants during each grant cycle. The grant provides full funding for positions for a period of two years.

The Monroe Fire Department will be adding seven career positions to its current staff, with six of those positions being in field operations and one in the Department’s Community Paramedic Program. Operationally speaking, this will allow the Department to provide an enhanced level of protection its own staff, the residents, and workers in our growing community.

The grant was written by Monroe Firemedic Matt Lolli, and will be managed through Fire Administration. Without the support and ongoing interest in our safety services by our City Council and Manager, this grant would not have been possible.

Fire Prevention Week

The Fire Prevention Week theme this year is “Don’t Wait - Check the Date! Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years.”

Smoke alarms are a key part of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire. Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement. Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound. Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.

Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working. There are two kinds of alarms. Ionization smoke alarms are quicker to warn about flaming fires. Photo-electric alarms are quicker to warn about smoldering fires. It is best to use both types of alarms in the home. A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet from the stove. People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.

Get everyone in your household together and make a home escape plan. Walk through your home and look for two ways out of every room. Make sure escape routes are clear of debris and doors and windows open easily. Windows with security bars and grills should have an emergency release device. Plan an outside meeting place where everyone will meet once they have escaped. A good meeting place is something permanent, like a tree, light pole, or mailbox a safe distance in front of the home. If there are infants, older adults, family members with mobility limitations or children who do not wake to the sound of the smoke alarm, make sure that someone is assigned to assist them in the event of an emergency. If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Respond quickly - get up and go, remember to know two ways out of every room, get yourself outside quickly, and go to your outside meeting place with your family.




Did you know? In 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first National Fire Prevention Day proclamation, and since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed on the Sunday through Saturday period in which October 9 falls. According to the National Archives and Records Administration's Library Information Center, Fire Prevention Week is the longest running public health and safety observance on record. The President of the United States has signed a proclamation proclaiming a national observance during that week every year since 1925.

School is Back in Session

School is back in session and the school buses are running their routes. It is important to be aware of children standing at all bus stops and at the end of the driveways. We must also follow laws concerning school buses. On multi-lane (continuously paved roadways), vehicles traveling in both directions must stop. On divided roadways (roadways with a barrier or grass median more than five feet), vehicles traveling the same direction as the bus must stop while vehicles in the oncoming lane are not required to stop. Please see the illustration below.

As fall approaches, we will begin to see piles of leaves along the roadside. Children sometimes play and or hide in the piles. We must make every attempt to avoid driving through these piles to avoid possible injury to others. Safe driving speed and attentiveness will help keep our children safe.

2016 Leaf Pick Up Schedule

The City of Monroe will begin their leaf pickup during the week of October 17, 2016 and end during the week of November 28, 2016. Leaves should be raked in piles along the curb line no more than six feet from the curb line, but not in the street or blocking storm water inlets. **Leaves that are combined with grass clippings will not be collected.** Leaves must be raked to the curb no later than 7:00 am on Monday of your scheduled week. Leaves raked after this time may not be picked up until the next scheduled week, if any. You may see the Street Department in your area during a time when it is not scheduled. As time permits, we will be going through non-scheduled areas in an effort to keep up with the falling leaves. There will be no leaf pickup the week of Thanksgiving. **Any leaves gathered after your scheduled week, will not be collected and must be bagged and put out with your garbage for Rumpke to pick up.** If you have any questions, please contact Gina Hugar or Donna Turman at 513-727-8953.
